Brazil is still in a difficult position!

The Brazilian economy is still in a vulnerable position in 2019: Annual Gross Domestic Product growth 0,8 %, Unemployment 11,9%, Inflation 3,6% and Selic will most likely reach 5% this year. Exchange rate reached in September 4,18 Real to the US Dollar due to many factors such as the China - US trade war and the many uncertainties with the government in regard to the Reform Previdência and other major reforms in the future. The best estimate for 2019 will be R\$ 3,80 to the dollar by the end of the year.

President Jair Bolsonaro image has never been lower in the present time due to the political disasters on the Amazon fires issues which the Europeans simply can't accept and at the same time the Presidents untimely comments which are keys to his low image.

We hope that Brazilian economy and the Reform Previdência will be approved as soon as possible and some of the economy factors will go in a positive direction.

Denmark's election on June 5th was a big success for the Social Democrats with Mette Frederiksen who forms a minority government with her as prime minister. The government are depending on getting support from the Red- Green Alliance, Socialist People's Party and particularly Danish Social Liberal Party.

Prime Minister Mette Frederiksen has already suggested increase in different taxes like the inheritance tax and also for Danes living abroad. It's not very popular and we hope the prime minister with more experience will lead Denmark in a more positive direction.

There are still many changes in Danish companies: in Brazil DSV, WS Audiology and ISS has all got new managing directors. The healthcare sector where Danish companies are still very strong make double digit growth numbers in Brazil despite the uncertain economy. This is Denmark's strongest industrial sector.

H.R.H. Princess Benedikte will make a visit to Brazil, São Paulo, Curitiba and Iguazu Falls on the date's 20th - 25th of October. Which includes the inauguration of the Princess Benedikte Institute in Curitiba, which will have more than 20/30 handicapped children. It will be a very modern Institute, which are the first Royal Danish social project in Brazil and in the world. We are looking forward to welcome H.R.H. Princess Benedikte to Brazil.

Mette Frederiksen Denmark's new Prime Minister

Denmark's new prime minister, 41
years old Mette Frederiksen from
the Social Democrats is far from
unknown in Danish politics. She
grew up in a house in Aalborg,
Denmark with her older brother
and parents. Politic was part of the
Mette Frederiksen's family since
her father and grandfather were
members of the Social Democrats.
So politics has always been a part
of Mette Frederiksen's life.

In 1992 she became active in politics when she became a member of the Danish Social Democrats Youth. At that time, she was a young short-haired, stubborn, passionate idealist with opinions and values and she was not afraid to say them out loud and take part in the discussions. An example of that was that she was an ardent supporter of the ban on buying sex like they had done in Sweden and she wanted to send more people on early retirement.

At the age of 24, in 2001, she was elected as a member of the Danish Parliament for the Social Democrats. In the first years in the Parliament Mette Frederiksen didn't have any central role in the Social Democrats party. She was completely new in the political landscape, and when Helle Thorn-

ing-Schmidt became leader of the Social Democrats, she held Mette Frederiksen in a stretched arm, partly because she was considered to be too left-wing.

Mette Frederiksen's political breakthrough came in 2011 when Helle Thorning-Schmidt was elected as prime minister and she was to form the new government. It was expected that Mette Frederiksen would get a very important ministerial post. She got Minister of Employment. Not an easy job where unpopular decisions had to be made but she managed to navigate through the difficulties.

In the following years Mette Frederiksen managed to make her positions and alliances stronger. She had become immensely popular within the Social Democrats party. So, when Helle Thorning-Schmidt lost her reelection to continue as prime minister and resigned as leader of the Social Democrats in 2015 Mette Frederiksen was the only candidate to become the new leader of the Social Democrats.

For the last 4 years Mette Frederiksen has been the leader of the Social Democrats. When she took over from Helle Thorning-Schmidt she had a plan and strategy for how to take the position as prime minister. A strategy to draw voters back to the Social Democrats. Among one of the main things

in the plan, that should be achieved was a significant shift in the Social Democrats foreign policy. It should be tighter. It wasn't that popular in every part of the Social Democrats hinterland, but most accepted it. It's also something far away from what Mette Frederiksen meant in 2001 when she felt that the foreign policy filled too much in the election campaign and the reason why the Social Democrats and left block were defeated.

2019 became the year Mette Frederiksen could put the crown on her political career as winner of the Danish election 2019 on June 5th and become Denmark's new prime minister.

After 3 weeks of intense negotiations with the other political parties in the left-block Mette Frederiksen got the one-party government she wanted and she could present her new government with only ministers from her own Social Democrats party and with the support from the other 3 parties: Danish Social Liberal Party, The Socialist People's Party and The Red—Green Alliance. All 4 parties have made a political agreement called: "Fair direction for Denmark". The opposition has already criticized the agreement for pulling Denmark in the wrong direction.

Criticism is inevitable when you are the one who is to lead Denmark. And it is far from the first time that Mette Frederiksen has faced critical voices. Like when she criticized parents who put their children in private school - but did the same with her children. Despite that, Mette Frederiksen has already put her name in the history books to become Denmark's second female prime minister after former prime minister Helle Thorning-Schmidt and she is also the youngest prime minister Denmark has ever had.

The future will show if Mette can get her politics through with the support from other parties in left-block and into which direction she will take Denmark nationally and internationally.

H.R.H. Princess Benedikte **Your Royal Highness, what stands Amalienborg** out from your previous visit to


Brazil which took place in 2008? That was actually my very first visit to Brazil, a gigantic country abounding with things to see and do. I was fortunate enough to get to visit four cities over the course of


eight days. It gave me some insight into a small part of Brazil, which seems to be huge, fantastic, and very dynamic. It will be exciting to go back there after all these years to see how the country might have changed and be open to new inspiration.

YRH, what are your expectations for your visit in 2019, where you will inaugurate your Institute in Curitiba?

It will be the first time that I visit Curitiba, which in itself is exciting. I am going there to inaugurate the Children's Institute bearing my name, which naturally will confer a truly special bond between me and the city; this present has been bestowed upon me

Your Institute is indeed unique and was created to help children with a lot of support from both Danish and Brazilian companies.





YRH, do you have any comments to this fact?

I believe that Denmark, and certainly also Brazil, are keenly aware of the need to help vulnerable children as children make up the coming generation. It is of course not possible to compare the conditions of children in Denmark to those of children in Brazil. This is something which has to be acknowledged; the new Institute will be a small piece in the big picture. Hopefully, it will expand in size and importance over time, but it is already a first step towards helping children who are found to be in vulnerable or neglectful situations for whatever reason.

YRH, it would interesting to hear your impression of the Brazilian graffiti artist who has decorated the walls at the Institute and created a portrait of you and Copenhagen.

I have only seen the work in the pictures you have shown me; it looks great. I am looking forward to seeing it myself; I am sure that it must be even more impressive in person.





YRH, as you know, this is the first Danish social project in Brazil, and as far as I know, the first royal project of its kind in the world. Do you have any comments?

I believe that it is a great honor and I hope that the Institute will be able to live up to everybody's expectations, not least thanks to all the goodwill and financial support that especially Danish companies generously have made available.

YRH, you will visit Sao Paulo, Curitiba and Iguazu during your stay in Brazil. Moreover, you will have the opportunity to visit some Danish companies there. Any comments?

I think that it is always very interesting and inspiring to meet representatives from our great companies. There are all kinds of people among them, not least in Brazil, and it is most interesting to see people in settings so foreign from the Danish ones. It is nice to see the energy and drive these people display; some of them have been working in Brazil for decades by now.

YRH, I know that you will give several speeches during your visit. I would like to know if there is any particular message that you plan to convey to the Brazilians and the children you will meet?

I have not thought that through yet, as I have just been informed that I will be giving these speeches. I of course intend to talk about the Institute, though, and how we should help the children who are at the Institute, so that they may experience healthy and safe childhoods and perhaps also be helped on their further journey down the road.

YRH, we have plans for another Institute in the state of Sao Paulo, as we all believe that your Institute is a good option for specially children in emergency situations. Any comments?

It is impossible to compare; we do not have the same kinds of problems in Denmark at all. There are a lot of factors that lead to the situation being what it is in Brazil, I do not believe I have to bring them up here. It is very unfortunate, though. Countries that have the means to do so should help; I would almost say that we have a duty to help whenever possible. We should not turn a blind eye to these problems. Instead, we have to look beyond ourselves and reach out. We have to extend our help to these vulnerable children who are not at fault. Whatever brought about these situations, e.g. illness or any other reason, is not the responsibility of a child. So, they have to be helped and receive support so as to prepare them for the future; that is what we have to do.

YRH, do you have a message that you would like to impart?

I believe that it is important to be forthcoming and willing to listen to other people.
I am passionate about Denmark.
We should meet other people with an open mind and heart.

Bertel Haarder celebrates 75 years

The longest-serving member of the Danish Parliament, former Minister Bertel Haarder (V), turns 75 years tomorrow. Kristeligt Dagblad has asked him to answer some indepth questions about his life

Interview in Kristeligt Dagblad

What has been the most important event in your life in recent years?

I believe that the answer would have to be the fact that my 8th grandchild was born very prematurely, but ultimately survived. That definitely means a lot.

What has brought you the greatest amount of happiness and pleasure in your life?

The four years during which I served as Minister of Integration, European affairs and Development at the same time. I have never been that busy in my life, and we truly accomplished a lot during this time. I was responsible for restructuring the immigration policies, and the measures that were imple-

mented at that time have become virtually sacrosanct since then. This is a testament to the fact that happiness is not about not having to work. Happiness resides in knowing that you are needed and that you are accomplishing something. Moreover, I would also have to mention Denmark's Democratic Festival on Bornholm and the meetings in Sorø which were thought up by Bertel Haarder himself, both of which have added an entirely new dimension to Danish politics.

Which individuals, besides your spouse, have had the biggest impact on how you turned out?


Politically speaking, Henning Christophersen deceased, former Minister and Chairman of Venstre, the Liberal Party of Denmark. He was my principal mentor and the most creative leader Venstre has ever had. World-class trouble-shooter. In addition, he was an extremely nice person. We also got together socially, outside work.

What advice would you give to people who want to go into politics?

Wait! Do not enter Parliament straight from university and a position as a secretary. This is an unfortunately common path. Instead, you need to gain experience in real life before embarking on a life in politics; you have to work a regular job in a company and learn what politics look like from that angle. You also have to keep your expectations low. The initial period in politics is brutal. Just ask the nine recently elected new MPs in Venstre's Parliamentary Group. I am sure that this has been their worst summer ever.

It was dreadful for me when I started out in the Parliamentary Group. The worst part was that no information was shared within the Group. I believe that the most recent newcomers might unfortunately be having the same experience.

The most important piece of advice is this, though: Carve out a niche for yourself. One of the new members of Venstre's Group was very creative and asked to be named spokesperson for antibureaucracy within her commissions; she succeeded therein. This is how to go about it.

What has been the most important factor which enabled you to have a career in politics?

Definitely my passionate societal commitment which began when I was a teacher at Askov Folk School and grew further while I was working as an assistant lecturer at the training colleges in Haderslev and Aalborg. If you are not fully committed, you should not enter into politics. Commitment makes it bearable to have your weekends and evenings wrecked, and having the phone ringing off the hook at all hours.

Have you experienced any profound sorrow or loss?

We have four children; our second-born was rendered severely handicapped as a result of cancer treatment at the age of five. That is all I would like to share on this subject.

When was the last time you threw caution to the wind?

This past Friday - and that is all I have to say about this as well Bertel Haarder had published a Facebook post the previous Friday in which he publicly supported a change in the leadership of Venstre in the midst of a heated dispute over the chairmanship of the party.

How do you remind of your parents?

I can see my father in my temper, and my mother in my knack for objective reflection. They were very different from one another, and I have certainly inherited a lot of traits from both of them. There is also the fact that I have never put politics above everything else in life. I believe that the reason why I have lasted so long in politics is that I have never risen to the very top. I have seen

too much. I have witnessed how Henning Christophersen, Anders Fogh, Lars Løkke and Kristian Jensen worked themselves to the bone while making their rounds endlessly within the organization. That is not for me. Politics have never been the most important thing in my life.

What do you believe in?

I think I would prefer to keep that to myself. But I guess I can share that I went to church last Sunday; as a matter of fact, I feel uneasy if I do not go to church on Sundays. I am definitely one of those Christians from the Church of Denmark who attend Sunday service. I was under the guidance of three solid theologians, namely Knud Hansen, Hans Henningsen and Richard Andersen, while I was a teacher at Askov Folk School.


What has brought you the greatest joy in life, besides your family?

Going on bicycle rides, winter swimming, and tending to my garden. Oh, and the summer cottage we have had for a couple of years by now. I am an avid birdwatcher and my family can confirm that I take great joy in being able to identify the songs of birds. I know a lot of these songs; the task has been made easier now where it is possible to simply google them. Perhaps this constitutes cheating, but it makes it possible to confirm your findings.

Describe a scene from your child-hood.

Once I wrecked my Optimist sailboat out on Flensburg Firth. The mast broke off, but I managed to fight my way back to shore. I also had a flipper boat and a kayak; Flensburg Firth is the loveliest place on Earth. At another occasion, the flipper boat foundered, and I went overboard. This time, I had managed to lose only the keel and rudder, so I had to play their part while maneuvering the boat safely back in. I have also been in a boat wreck on Sorø Lake; our handicapped son was actually with me on that occasion. All in all, I have survived three wrecks. I still love sailing, but do it much too rarely nowadays.

EU Mercosur accord

EU and Mercosur have - at a political level - reached a historic trade agreement after 20 years of negotiations, though still subject to technical/legal revision and final approval by the respective member states of the EU and Mercosur. The agreement will enhance the framework conditions and open up trade between the blocs as it contains commitments to liberalize more than 90% of the current trade. According to the EU Commission this could result in 4 billion EUR in tariff savings for EU companies.

In Brazil, the agreement is seen as a political victory for the government, as it is in line with its efforts to liberalize the economy. Furthermore, there is an important geopolitical dimension, since the agreement fits well with the ambition to achieve OECD membership — an ambition that Denmark supports — and enhance economic relations

with advanced economies. The agreement will bring significantly improved framework conditions, which at the same time gives the EU companies a kind of first-mover advantage, as it is likely to be the first major free trade agreement for Mercosur.

Most of the Danish companies that already export to Brazil will obviously benefit from this agreement. However, it is extremely important to bear in mind that a large number of Danish export sectors - so far - have not exported to Brazil because of the high entry barriers (e.g. tariffs). This includes many typical consumer products (dairy products, clothing / fashion, shoes, etc.). In the light of the agreement, it will be important for these companies to take a renewed look at the Brazilian market.

A trade agreement obviously is a two-way street and therefore also includes some ob-

vious advantages for Brazilian exporters, including Brazilian beef, poultry and sugar. As mentioned, even though the agreement in principle is now closed, the technical/legal revision and subsequent political approval are still pending on both sides. In Brazil, the agreement must be reviewed and approved by the two houses of parliament, the Chamber of Deputies first and then the Senate.

In the EU, the national parliaments and regional parliaments have to ratify the political part, while the EU parliament has to ratify the trade part of the agreement.



Trade Agreement between the EU and Mercosur

The EU and Mercosur have since 2000 negotiated a trade agreement and on June 28th, the two unions reached what the EU in a press release calls an "ambitious, balanced and comprehensive trade agreement". This new trade framework is part of a wider association agreement that has been negotiated since 2000.

The EU is the most important trade partner for the Mercosur region and will now be the first major partner to reach an agreement with this South American union. Mercosur and the EU together form a population of almost 800 million people. The agreement expresses a big plan for commitment between the two regions and plans for future partnership.

According to the Consul General of Denmark in São Paulo, Nikolaj Fredsted, the reach of an agreement is great news for Denmark and the EU. "It consolidates and develops the EU's position of strength in the region — a region with massive economic potential for Danish business and interests. The deal will form the basis of an increased partnership in the future", says the Consul General.

The main object of the agreement is to remove a majority of tariffs on products circulating within the two unions. This will take time hence the agreement will be gradually implemented. Furthermore, the agreement is still to be finally ratified. According to the EU Commission, EU countries will save €4 billion worth of duties per year on exports to Mercosur after tariffs are eliminated. Especially high tariffs on key sectors such as cars, machinery, chemicals and pharmaceuticals will be eliminated. Furthermore, EU farmers and food producers will on the export side benefit since e.g. dairy products, chocolate and wine at present are subject

to substantial tariffs when exporting to Mercosur.

Mercosur is Denmark's eighth biggest trade partner outside the EU; the value of Danish exports to Mercosur is €1.7 billion while Mercosur's export to Denmark has a value of €1.1 billion. The agreement will most likely only let these numbers increase. "From a Danish-Brazilian perspective, major Danish export interests are at present and I do expect that this agreement will bring a new focus on the Brazilian market", says Nikolaj Fredsted.

However, the most significant subject in the negotiations towards a final agreement relates to agriculture and EU farmers. Some EU-countries express criticism against the threat of livelihood of EU farmers particularly on beef, poultry, sugar and ethanol. These countries demand that the quotas on these products must not increase. They fear that larger Mercosur companies on certain areas will wipe out smaller European firms. Finally, the agreement contains regulation on food safety and sustainable development. The EU has high standards relating to food safety and these will remain unchanged meanwhile the Mercosur companies must comply accordingly. Furthermore, the agreement will address aspects of sustainable farming and both the EU and Mercosur are committed to implementing the Paris Agreement.

Bradesco The convergence of the Brazilian interest rate

The pension reform bill has moved significantly forward in the National Congress; seemingly, it will be approved in the Senate by the end of the year. This reform will represent savings of about BRL 850 billion for the public coffers over the coming 10 years. This achievement means that one of the main medium-term risks in the country, i.e. that of fiscal insolvency, will be greatly reduced. This is a confirmation of the trend which sees the state playing a decreasing role in the economy, while the domestic and foreign private sectors are being invited to take the lead in terms of generating growth in the country.

In addition to the pension reform, there is encouraging progress underway within other areas. The country is beginning to discuss a major tax reform, there is a promising privatization process in the pipeline, there is a major restructuring underway in sectors such as gas and sanitation that will help improve infrastructure and reduce industrial costs, there are plans towards simplifying the business environment and, finally, clear steps towards greater trade liberalization - such as the promises to reduce import tariffs and the important Mercosur agreement with the European Union.

It is very likely that these measures will be able to accelerate the country's growth rate in the coming years. Asset prices - such as the stock market at its all-time high and the country risk rating, which is below the average seen during the time when the country was still investment grade - seem to be foreshadowing this improvement in the economy. But beyond the acceleration of the GDP growth rate, it is very likely that we are facing a concrete possibility of Brazil's interest rates converging to

international standards, which will produce much more favorable conditions for the increase of business investments in the coming years.

When measured in terms of the Selic rate, the real interest rate is around 2.5% compared to an average of 1.7% in the following group of countries: Mexico, Indonesia, Peru, India, South Africa, Colombia, Thailand, Chile, Poland, and Hungary. Although the Brazilian level is close to that of this group, there is a fundamental difference in the marginal conditions between these economies and the Brazilian one. While these countries are seeing their unemployment rates at their historical averages, Brazil's unemployment rate is almost 3.0 pp above it. Similarly, while inflation is right in the middle of the target in these countries, inflation in Brazil is around 60 basis points (bps) below the center of the goal. As long as unemployment does not decline and inflation remains steady, there is room to converge towards or even fall below our emerging peers.

As for the long-term rate, Brazil has an unprecedented 10-year nominal interest rate of around 7.5%, compared to a median of 5.7% of that same group. However, the average inflation target in these countries is 3.1% while Brazil's long-term target is 3.5%. Therefore, the long-term view in Brazil embeds about 40 bps more in inflation than in the average of these countries. In addition to the greater inflation differential when compared to the rest of the world, the country risk rating is also higher in Brazil. However, by managing the inflation and risk differentials between Brazil and the emerging markets, our nominal rate may still fall at least 100 bps so as to meet up with this group of countries.

It is a fact that obtaining and keeping interest rates at the average seen in emerging countries would require Brazil to adapt some of the policies of these countries in terms of fundamental macroeconomic measures, such as trade liberalization, flexibility in conducting business, tax burden, and sustainability of the public debt. But it is precisely these issues that the pension reform and the other reforms mentioned herein are intending to address. However, it seems reasonable to suppose that as long as the other reforms are mere projects, the idle economy will keep interest rates low for a long time to come and thus not pressure inflation levels.

What are the expected consequences of this period of low interest rates for the economy? Firstly, the economy must embark upon a trajectory of economic recovery. There is no evidence that monetary policies do not work in Brazil. This should not be mistaken for the speed of recovery, which tends to be slower as the pri-

vate sector needs to see reforms approved and uncertainties of various kinds reduced, including within the regulatory and tax areas, in order for it to be a main driver of growth. Indeed, with interest rates at these levels, the prospects for infrastructure and capital-intensive sectors are very promising as both of these are sensitive to extensions in duration. Huge expected gains in valuation for companies are also not beyond the realms of possibility.

Secondly, there are important transformations in the universe of portfolio investments and funding sources for companies. Lower interest rates lead to private credit expanding and relevant opportunities in the world of corporate debt being created. While emerging countries see private credit rates of 135% of GDP, in Brazil this rate is only 70%. Similarly, in the variable income universe: while the allocation of Brazilian households into shares does not exceed 10% of their portfolio, in the developed world this allocation approaches 50%. A similar tendency is noted in the foreign currency allocation of Brazilian households, which was historically low due to the country's interest rate differential. In a low interest rate scenario, the pursuit of return involves

foreign assets.

Finally, with the maintenance of the spending ceiling and the expected recovery

of the primary surplus in the coming years, debt dynamics will become much less unfavorable and will thus contribute towards bringing Brazil closer to the ratings and public debt metrics observed in other countries.

While it does seem premature to proclaim the end of the era of high interest rates in Brazil, global and domestic conjuncture circumstances have brought us closer to the levels seen in the rest of the world, and if the reforms push forward, the possibility of effective convergence in the coming years will come true.

Pension reform is a major step but more needs to be done

The first half of 2019 was marked by a dramatic mood change and the realization that it will be another year of weak growth. But there is still hope that this can be the last of such years, after an arduous transition period. Whether this is the case or not will depend crucially on the advance of a reform agenda that Brazil's economy badly needs.

In that regard, it was very important to see the base text of the pension reform bill (PEC 06/2019) being approved by the Lower House in a first-round vote recently. According to our estimates, the bill in its approved form will yield savings of about BRL 865 billion, or 1.8 p.p. of GDP, in the 10 years between 2020 and 2029. This is a meaningful impact compared to expectations and we see the reform bill being fully approved by Congress in 3Q19, with no additional changes.



Despite this crucial step towards fiscal sustainability, we should remember that reforming the pension system is a necessary, albeit not sufficient, condition for the stabilization of Brazil's public debt over a longer horizon. That said, we expect that the rebound in growth and interest rate declines allowed by the reforms (pension and those yet to come) — which could become persistent — will significantly slow the growth of public debt. As a result, we forecast that public debt will remain relatively stable around 80% of GDP in coming years.

In light of the recent progress of the pension reform in Congress, the central bank's signals that a new monetary easing cycle could start in its July 30-31 monetary policy committee (Copom) meeting have gained significant weight. Inflation rate below target and expected to remain so for long, and more favorable external winds, given the trade truce between the U.S. and China, add to the perceived drop of risks in the domestic scenario that resulted from progress in the pension reform, making a clear case for interest rate cuts. We expect this new easing cycle to drive the Selic rate down to 5.00% p.a. before year-end and see it staying at this level throughout 2020 as well.

In our view, interest rate cuts will likely contribute to a pickup of GDP in 2020, even though the effect of these cuts will likely be partially offset by a slowdown in the global economy, hindering a stronger recovery in activity. We forecast 1.7% growth rate for 2020. This year, nonetheless, economic activity figures are still pointing to below 1.0% growth – we expect GDP to increase only 0.8% in 2019. These figures may be



impacted by the government intention to release resources from workers' mandatory severance funds (FGTS), which we estimate may have a one-off impact on GDP to the tune of 0.2%/0.3% (the government expects and impact of 0.35%). The withdrawals will likely start only in September, so the positive impact is likely to be felt from 4Q19 on. Importantly, these are short term effects and will not change the medium term outlook for growth per se.

In what regards the pension reform, even though it is an important first step towards a virtuous cycle of economic recovery, we do not expect it alone to result in immediate strong growth acceleration. Be it because firms still have plenty spare capacity, because they have already been frustrated by weak demand in recent past or because companies do not react to political prospects but rather to profits, the recovery is likely to be gradual. Falling interest rates and increased confidence will translate little by little into greater consumption and investment, and this process should gain more traction only when levels of spare capacity in the economy have already shown some retreat.

But more can be done to speed up growth. In our view, the road to a faster recovery goes through the adoption of other measures and reforms that may increase the efficiency in the Brazilian economy. We see the simplification of the business environment in general, and of the tax system in particular, and increasing predictability for long-term investments as the main goals to be pursued ahead. In that regard, the likely focus of the post-pension reform agenda on a significant tax reform, on the selling of assets by the government and on the creation of new financing models and regulations that lower legal uncertainty for long term investors, provide additional signals that we will eventually come out of this long period of very low growth rates in Brazil.



The first step of a long journey

In mid-July, the controversial bill related to the reform of the Brazilian national pension system managed to overcome the first round vote in the Brazilian Lower House by a large margin of votes in its favor. As a result, Brazilian financial asset prices registered an immediate improvement as the feat pointed towards better perspectives for the Brazilian fiscal balance in the coming years, which should diminish fears about the trajectory of the Brazilian public indebtedness. It is true that the bill still needs to overcome the second round vote in the Lower House and yet further two round votes in the Senate, but it seems to have gathered enough popular support to do so. According to surveys carried out by a domestic private pollster - the so-called Datafolha – whereas the percentage of interviewed persons who were against the bill declined from 51% to 44% between April of 2019 and July of 2019, the number of those persons who were in favour of the bill increased from 41% to 47% in that period. Such a development illustrates the favourable momentum for changes in the national pension system. Hence, there seems to be low chances for the appearance of setbacks in the coming stages.

The potential approval of the pension system reform should not only reduce fears

about the sustainability of the Brazilian fiscal balance, but it should also allow the country to experience a protracted period of low interest rates - for Brazilian standards - as it will curb the appetite with which the public sector seeks financial resources in the financial market, thus opening room for the so-called 'crowding-in' effect. That is, as public sector borrowing requirements slows down, there should be more financial resources for the private sector to count on in order to finance its investment plans. Consequently, that is likely to increase the capacity of Brazilian companies to produce goods and services. In other words, it expands the potential GDP growth, which means the country should be able to grow at a faster pace without facing problems with inflation dynamics.

Incidentally, when one looks at the Brazilian Central Bank survey, one realizes that market participants' inflation forecasts are pretty much in line with targets set for the monetary authority until the foreseeable future. In tandem with that, current inflation figures have also run at very comfortable levels, which

fortable levels, which points to a scenario in which meeting infla-

Jankiel Santos, Santander tion goals ahead should be an easy task. Moreover, it hints at additional room for a reduction in the base interest rate in the short term. Resorting once again to the Brazilian Central Bank survey, the median of market participants' forecasts for the Selic target rate for the end of 2019 was 5.50% pa, thus below the current 6.50% pa level. What's more, the forecast for the end of next year is also 5.50% pa, which shows how confident market participants are on the maintenance of a new historical low for the Brazilian base interest rate for a protracted period of time.

Those are definitely good news for Brazilian companies and citizens, as they will be able to borrow money at cheaper costs than before. Therefore, both

investments and private consumption are likely to register better performances in the coming quarters, which should contribute to an improvement in confidence indices as well. On the back of higher confidence on both entrepreneur and consumer levels, we are supposed to see a stronger decline in the unemployment rate, which has hovered around 12% for the last couple of months. Consequently, wages should start showing some recovery, thus reinforcing domestic demand further. Overall, these elements are likely to lead the GDP growth to speed up its pace in the near future.

As one should have noticed, the approval of the pension system bill has apparently unlocked several possibilities for an improvement in the economic perspectives for the country, but it is important to bear in mind that, although necessary, the reform is no silver bullet. After all, it should only slow down the rhythm at which the public indebtedness is supposed to grow and, eventually, stabilise it in a few years. The problem is that such levelling off is likely to

happen at a high level, which means that more structural reforms are required.

For instance, the budget framework of the Brazilian public system is full of rigidities that create inefficiencies and lead to waste of public resources. For example, according to the World Bank's database, Brazilian government spending on education amounted to 6.2% of the GDP in 2015, while such ratio for OECD members reached 5.2% of their GDP in the same period. Unfortunately, that higher level of spending has not translated into a better performance of Brazilian students as compared with pupils of OECD members as measured by the PISA ranking (Programme for International Student Assessment). Hence, it is not just a matter of spending (squandering?) money, but it is also important to assess if these resources are being used in an efficient fashion. Granting flexible structures for the public budget is an important change that needs to materialise soon.

Another critical bottleneck that requires attention refers to the intricate Brazilian

tax system. Fortunately, there are signs that the Brazilian Lower House is going to tackle this knotty theme in the coming months. Similar to what happened with the pension system, the debate on the subject promises to be a heated one. Although everybody seemingly supports changes in the tax system, no state governor wants to lose resources, as many of them are facing quite hard times with their fiscal balances. Therefore, one should not expect reductions in the tax burden in the short term but rather a simplification in the way the public sector will collect taxes. Given the complexity of the present system, there is no doubt that this move should already bring visible benefits to economic agents.

In sum, the celebrated approval of the pension reform was an important move towards the generation of a more sustainable business environment in Brazil, but it was just the first step of a very long journey. It's time to take further steps.



Danish-Brazilian cooperation in the area of e-government

Approximately three years ago, Denmark and Brazil initiated a government-to-government cooperation within the area of e-government.

In many ways, it was an obvious area to initiate a cooperation in, as Denmark today is the global leader in this area. It is important to underline that the Danish lead-

ing position did not happen overnight – far from it. Denmark embarked on this path app. 15 years ago and it certainly has not been an easy ride all the way as – seen in hindsight - not all choices taken along the way turned out to be the right ones. This is obviously not surprising as it is an inevitable part of pioneering into a new area –

as e-government certainly was in the early days - where state-of-the art solutions rapidly are overtaken by new technological developments that allows for even smarter solutions.

In the beginning one of the most obvious errors - again seen in hindsight - was that a variety of state and local public sector entities each launched their own digital solution. While this might have made life easier for the different authorities, it did not necessarily do so for the citizens and businesses. Not only did they have to deal with a multitude of logins and passwords, but also struggle with systems that, basically, were designed to make life easy for the authority – not necessarily its clients. Today this is different, as all Danes now have their own digital signature and digital mailbox that literally has become the interface with all branches of government. This is where Danes - citizens and businesses - receive (digital) letters and interacts with all public authorities, being within health, taxation, education, etc. To make life even easier, contact/correspondence with a variety of private service have been added since (banks, insurance companies, utility providers, etc.), meaning that literally everything today can be handled digitally. Brazil on its part has for years been strug-

gling with heavy bureaucracy. It is therefore encouraging to experience that the current Brazilian government seem to have put exactly e-government high on its agenda, with the Ministry of Economy being the lead ministry. The same seems to be the case of a number of the larger states (São Paulo, Minas Gerais, etc.) where serious efforts also are taken place. As much as it is plausible, it is also understandable that this is given high priority, as the upsides are obvious and often with an immediate effect: cost/time-saving, improved efficiency, better user experience (citizens and businesses), increased productivity and competitiveness. In the case of Brazil, it is furthermore important to highlight that digitalizing government procedures and services also reduces the room for corruption due to the transparency and traceability that characterises these procedures. The current efforts by the Brazilian Government also has a foreign policy dimension, as these improvements are an important prerequisite for a future Brazilian membership of the OECD – which Denmark supports.

There are in other words a number of reasons for Denmark and Brazil to cooperate in this area, but a few things should be kept in mind - which influences and characterises our cooperation. Firstly, it is important to acknowledge that the characteristics of Denmark and Brazil are very different: Size of population, geographical extension, state structure, constitutional division of powers, etc. - just to mention a few. In other words, it would be naïve to think that whatever solutions we have come up with in Denmark, automatically can be applied in Brazil. They need to be adapted to the local realities and conditions. This obviously also reflects in our cooperation where focus is on education, training and - above all - inspiration that will enable Brazil to produce their own solutions. Secondly, as already mentioned, the Danish journey towards digitalization of government pro-



cedure and services has not been without challenges. Brazil can therefore not only learn from what we did right — but also from what we did wrong. By doing this, we believe that Brazil can "cut some corners" in the development of their own e-government solutions.

The fact that Brazil – partially influenced by Danish experiences – might be able to leap-frog their way to digitalizating government procedures and services, does not mean that it will be an easy task. Again, due note must be given to the characteristics of Brazil that indeed makes it more complicated than digitalizing a small and homogenous country like Denmark. It is therefore important that Brazil approach this with certain patience in order to make the right strategic choices that enables smart and durable solutions. It is only through such an approach that full benefits of e-government can be harvested.


Edith Bjerring celebrates 100 years anniversary

Elections 2019

Danish parliament election 2019 was held on June 5th. There were over 4 million voters and the turnout ended on 84,54%. The big winner of the election was the Social Democrats "Socialdemokraterne" with 25,9% and the Denmark's Liberal Party "Venstre" with 23,4%.

The Danish Social Liberal Party "Det Radikale Venstre", the Conservative People's Party "Det Konservative Folkeparti" and the Socialist People's Party "Socialistisk Folkeparti" had a very good election. It was a complete disaster for the Danish People's Party "Dansk Folkeparti" that has halved since the election in 2015 and Liberal Alliance.

After 3 weeks of very difficult negotiations, the Social Democrats made a one-party government with Mette Frederiksen as Prime Minister and a total of 20 ministers.

Only the future will tell if the Social Democrats can collaborate and get the support from the Danish Social Liberal Party, the Socialist People's Party and the Red-Green Alliance "Enhedslisten" within areas such as economy, immigration policy, environmental policy etc. to get their policies through. It's going to be an interesting time for Denmark and for the new government.





Brazil hosts a wealth of opportunities for the global pharmaceutical industry and is also the world's sixth largest pharma market - scheduled to rise to fifth position in the near future -, Brazil is becoming increasingly important in the strategies of all healthcare and life sciences companies with truly global ambitions.



The EU and Mercosur make trade agreement

The EU and four countries in the South American block Mercosur agree on a draft for a free trade agreement. Mercosur was founded in 1991 and consists of the following countries: Argentina, Uruguay, Paraquay, and Brazil.

The agreement has been concluded after almost 20 years of negotiations. It removes barriers to trade and contributes to increased exports from both parties.

There are high expectations for the agreement from both sides, i.e. the EU and Brazil.

The agreement will not come into force immediately, as it will still undergo technical and legal review, it will be translated into the 23 official languages of the member nations and, finally, the procedures for final approval by the Member-States of Mercosur and European Union.

According to the Brazilian Government, these procedures usually last between seven months and three years. Only after these steps will the content of the agreement be ratified and implemented by the signatory countries.

Brazil's President, Jair Bolsonaro, writes on Twitter:

that the EU-Mercosur agreement is historic - one of the most important agreements ever for this country.



European Parliament Elections 2019

All the countries in the European Union voted for the European Parliament 2019 between May 23rd – 26th. The voting percentage for the whole EU was 50,95% which is very high. It represents an increase of 8,34% since the last European Parliament Elections in 2014.

The Danish voting rate was 66.08%, the highest at an EU election ever and 6.54 percentage points higher than the previous record in 2009.

Gilberto Gil is a special friend of the Danish-Brazilian Chamber of Commerce and Denmark.















The company was founded in Scandinavia in 2000 and opened in Sao Paulo in 2012 and now works all over Brazil, Copenhagen and Oslo. With offices in one of the world's smallest capitals and one the biggest cities in the world, the company thrives on diversity and differences.

Adam Kurdahl has a broad experience from complex architectural and urban projects internationally. He has managed several large and small projects from competition to completion, focusing on marrying design

intent and urban strategies with successful business cases. Adam has been responsible for several award-winning projects and competitions like the Nedregate Culture District (Oslo City's Architecture award) Clarion Hotel Trondheim (Choice of the Stars), the Award-winning V-House (Houens Fund's Diploma for outstanding architecture). Adam was born in Copenhagen, studied Architecture and Urbanism at Delft University in the Netherlands and at Aarhus School of Architecture in Denmark from where he received his master's degree. Adam Kurdahl has taught at The Royal Danish Art Academy in Copenhagen, Politecnico di Milano and Oslo School of Architecture.

Among some highlight projects they are working on, are a project with Votorantim to revitalize the Vila Leopoldina neighborhood in Sao Paulo, turning an old industrial area into a vibrant new scene in the city. The site has been used by Votorantim for cement and metal fabrication. The unused industrial warehouses have been turned into ARCA and STATE.

STATE is a 15.000m2 coworking (offices) complex housed in the old warehouse. The offices sits under the huge glass roof and has 16meter ceiling height.

ARCA the second building is a event venue that host evenmts such as Sao Paulo Fashion week and Veja Beber e Comer festival. The two refurbished warehouses are connected by a boulevard, planted with trees and plants native to the Atlantic Forest

(Mata Atlantica). The boulevard is used for foodtrucks, kiosks and exhibitions and host a large restaurant, currently under construction. The neighborhood is refereed to as the "São Paulo's Silicon Valley".

Experts in renovation and urban regeneration SPOL worked with Fera Hotel on a masterplan for the creation of the Bahia Design District. The project revitalizes Rua Chile, Brazils first planned street, and includes the renovation of 13 historic UNESCO protected heritage buildings. The first project to be completed was the Fera Palace Hotel. The landmark building was built in the thirties and is an icon of the Art Deco style and was inspired by the Flat Iron building in New York. The hotel figures in Jorge Armados book about Dona Flor and has previously hosted Orson Wells and American presidents. Most recently the building was the choice of lodging for Nobel peace prize laureate Malala Yousafzai.

SPOL and Fera renovated each of the building 434 windows, the historic parket floors and redesigned the entire interior of the hotel including the design of the furniture. The hotel has been mentioned as a must visit by Wallpaper and several other international publications including New York and Financial Times.

The project led SPOL to be invited to work on the Cidade Matarazzo project at Paulista Avenue together with French architects Jean Nouvel (DR Koncertsal), Philip Starck, and Brasilian Architect Triptyque. The Cidade Matarazzo includes the renovation of more than 30.000m2 of listed heritage buildings and will include hotel, museum,

theater, jazzbar and more than 30 restaurants, several shops and large outdoor green areas.

Recently launched, NORD is an 8.000 m2 residential building located in Jardins, São Paulo. The building is inspired by Scandinavian design and has duplex apartments with a vast terrace that can be adapted depending on the lifestyle. The residence also offers a rooftop swimming pool and gym, and private event area. The building is from the developer Nortis, which is collaborating with SPOL on other projects, among others "Ventura" in Pinheiros that was launched for presale in august.

In Denmark SPOL recently completed the CPH House, a 500m2 private residence in Holte, north of Copenhagen. The house warming party at the house was a gala dinner in the benefit of KidsAid. Kids aid is a Danish Nonprofit organization helping cancerous children and their families in Den-

mark. Spols work on nonprofit project led them to donate the architectural designs for two private homes. The fees are donated uncut to the benefit of KidsAid in an agreement between the clients and the architect. Adam Kurdahl just returned from Amazonia and is eager to show us the most recent and smallest project the company is currently building. A nonprofit School in the Amazon Rainforest. The School is almost completely constructed and is built in collaboration with the local community, in an inclusive design process where the chldren of the community started the process together with SPOL in defining the space and design of the school. The school is built of locally harvested materials and is part of a larger project to provide information and education to reinforce the protection of the rainforest.

DI – Representing Danish business globally

DI is Denmark's largest business organisation representing nearly all business sectors. The membership of 11,000 companies is record high. In total, members of DI employ 0.5 million people in Denmark and 1 million outside Denmark.

The core mission for DI is to boost competitiveness of members to help them succeed in Denmark and abroad. DI does so through three main functions. Firstly, DI advises members on several issues related to their business. Secondly, DI represents member companies' interests in Denmark, the EU

and globally with the aim to create the best possible business conditions. Thirdly, DI is a network organization that establishes connections for our members towards other businesses and stakeholders.

As Denmark is a small open economy, Danish companies are heavily reliant on international trade. Local office in Brazil helps navigating in complex regulation

In many ways, Brazil is still a very protectionist economy. Together with Argentina, Brazil has the highest tariff barriers in G20, making it hard for overseas companies to access its attractive market. Our main advice to members is that you need to establish your own operation in Brazil to succeed in the market. This is the main reason why DI has had a local office in Brazil since 2006, assisting Danish companies to handle entry barriers, and to manage complex regulations.

DI's office is in Sao Paolo and it has 13 employees. In close cooperation with DI's headquarters in Copenhagen, the office in Brazil is offering members of DI market entry services, including entry strategy, establishment of Brazilian subsidiaries and full administration services. The clientele consists of companies of all sizes from different sectors. The most demanded services are assistance on employment law, payroll administration and accounting. Even though a more business-friendly President has taken office in Brazil, we ex-

Even though a more business-friendly President has taken office in Brazil, we expect that it will take many years to simplify complex regulations. This is underscored by Brazil's current position as number 109 in the World Bank's Doing Business Index.

First-mover advantage for European companies

Brazil is no longer the economic miracle it used to be in the 2000s, but it did get through the recession in 2014-2016. Since

2017 Brazil's GDP performed stable growth rates, which are expected to continue in the coming years. This creates prospects of growing markets for Danish exporters and investors. These positive tendencies are enhanced by the EU's great achievement to conclude a trade agreement with the South American trade bloc Mercosur (Argentina, Brazil, Paraguay and Uruguay) after 20 years of negotiations.

It is the first time that Mercosur concludes a trade deal with a large trade bloc, meaning that European exporters will gain a competitive advantage compared to for example American companies. The agreement will also benefit service providers since Mercosur agreed to open parts of the public procurement market and to provide better market access for European companies towards information technology, telecommunications, business services, financial services and transport.

Unfortunately, the EU-Mercosur agreement is criticized for causing deforestation and increased carbon emissions. Such criticism is misplaced. In fact, the agreement will commit Mercosur countries to meet the Paris agreement on climate and to protect the environment. This will in turn increase demand for sustainable solutions on which Danish companies have a competitive advantage.

The EU-Mercosur trade agreement needs to go through a long ratification process before it can take effect. In this process, the agreement will face opposition. This is why DI together with European partners will make an effort to convince stakeholder of the advantages of the agreement in terms om increased trade, job-creation and sustainable development. It is crucial for the EU not to miss the chance to gain first-mover advantage towards the promising and growing Brazilian market.

Telex Morten Hellberg, Telex

Morten, what is your business experience, who have you worked for in the past, and how long have you been with Telex?

I have a degree in economics with an MBA in strategy and leadership from IMD in Lausanne, Switzerland. I have always worked in big companies and in different countries, like Denmark, Spain, Korea, among others. In 2003 I was invited to join the Demant group - a Danish multinational leader in its field and a pioneer in revolutionary technological research for hearing solutions — and take over the direction of the Brazilian operations, based in Rio de Janeiro.

At the time, there was only Telex performing in the retail channel and the Oticon brand performing in the Government (wholesale) channel. Over the course of sixteen years under my management, the company has grown exponentially due to the implementation of new retail and gov-

ernment strategies, as well as the introduction of new businesses such as Interacoustics (Diagnostics), Oticon Medical (cochlear implant and bone anchored hearing aids), Sonic (hearing aids) and the expansion of the market coverage of Oticon products to the Independent channel, not only limited to the Government.

In recent years, my responsibility in the Demant group has surpassed the frontiers of Brazil and now I also currently lead the Mexican operations.

As we understand, Telex is a brand name of hearing equipment from the Danish company Demant group. In Denmark you are probably best known for your brand Oticon. Are you present with Oticon in the Brazilian Market, and can you tell us about your structure in Brazil?

The Centro Auditivo Telex company was acquired by the Demant in 2001. At the time, aside from bureaucratic reasons, the group decided to keep the name Telex instead of Oticon, because the former brand has always been correlated with credibility and good standing on the Brazilian market. This explains why the company name is Centro Auditivo Telex; however, it does not mean that we do not market the other brands from the Demant group. On the contrary, we offer the most complete range of hearing solutions for the hearing impaired, from hearing aids to cochlear implants, as well as accessories and diagnostic equipment. Therefore, our organizational structure is divided into three major businesses:

- Hearing Devices (hearing aids and accessories) Telex (retail), Oticon (government and independent) and Sonic (government and distributor);
- Hearing Implants (bone-anchored hearing systems and cochlear implants) Oticon Medical;
- 3) Diagnostics Instruments (a wide range of hearing-related equipment) Interacoustics (retail and distributor), Maico (distributor) and MedRx.

The success of Telex has been built through a mixed model of performance in retail, with subsidiaries and licensed stores in the main Brazilian cities, adding up to more than 100 points of sale, where it is possible to find devices that assist all degrees of hearing losses, and also get technical assistance. In addition to the brick and mortar stores, there are also five mobile clinics, which serve the population from places where either there are no shops nearby or





the customer has some mobility limitations. The Oticon products, renowned worldwide, are also distributed by us through two segments: Government and Independents (multi-brand stores). Sonic brand hearing aids - a US company acquired by the Demant group in 2010 - have also been sold on the Brazilian market since 2016.

Our reader probably knows Telex as a company that makes hearing aids, but I understand you also make Diagnostic Instruments and Hearing Implants, are all these areas represented in your Brazilian business?

Yes, as I mentioned earlier, in addition to the Hearing Devices division, the company possesses a Diagnostics Instruments business unit, whose main brand is Interacoustics. With premium image and high added value, the brand has great recognition among the medical and speech- pathology/ audiology fields. Currently, its distribution is performed by 6 representative companies and their POS.

Another business division is Hearing Implants, consisting of two product lines: bone-anchored hearing systems (BAHS)

and cochlear implants (IC), represented by Oticon Medical, which started performing in Brazil in September of 2013. CIs and BAHS are segments in Brazil that are considered to be a niche market.

Tell us a little bit about the hearing equipment market. How much does it grow a year and what will it look like in the near future?

The Brazilian market has been growing around 10% every year, which is considered a good growth rate if we consider the world average of 3-4% per year. Telex is amongst the strongest players in the market and, after some setbacks, has been consolidating its operations during recent years through the operation of branches and licensed shops. Telex has more than 70 years of operation in the Brazilian market with the greatest number of branches it has ever had and with most of its licensees satisfied with the way Telex is seen by competitors and customers. With a similar performance, the Oticon Independent channel has also been delivering sales growth and conquering hearing aids' market share, as well as, Government channel.

Do you have any sort of production or assembly in Brazil?

Our technical assistance office is located in Sao Paulo and consists of state-of-the-art equipment such as scanners and 3D printers, whose purpose is to print high definition molds of the client's ear anatomy for hearing aid assembly. We have a team of highly-qualified technicians to manufacture the molds of customized hearing aids (intra-auricular), as well as provide technical assistance to users of all products distributed in Brazil. We also have a dedicated technical assistance team for the Diagnostic Instruments division. With the exception of Oticon Medical products, where maintenance is done abroad, all other products are serviced in Brazil.

Demant group has recently increased its expectations for 2019, based on the financial results in the first six month. Are you also growing in Brazil?

In 2019, the Brazilian operation delivered a satisfactory growth. Telex (retail channel), Oticon (independent and government channel), Interacoustics and Oticon Medical were the key business areas that



achieved prominence last year. Our expectation is that this growth will continue in the upcoming years - even if the curve is discreet.

What are the major challenges for Telex in Brazil?

Our biggest challenge is to continue growing with sustainable actions. We are focusing mainly on the evaluation of the customer base versus collection of defaulters; the consolidation of retail and modernization project of the stores included since the change of Telex logo to a new concept of customer service, following a global model of the group; the expansion of Oticon Medical and the maximization of digital marketing efforts with a communication that reinforces the group's global slogan known as "People First". We want to emphasize, in the first place, the needs and desires of those who can't hear well, providing the most modern technology to recover hearing, with humanized care and communication; after all, we take care of the health of people who seek us to improve their quality of life.

What are the major opportunities in Brazil?

Last year the Opn[™], the first hearing aid connected to the internet, was launched. Breaking all the paradigms of the current audiological market, Opn[™] eliminates the limitations of the sound directionality available in the current hearing aids, allow-

ing the user to clearly hear the speech of several interlocutors and sounds, even in noisy environments.

We believe that with this product, both Telex and Oticon, through the Independent channel, can contribute to improving the lives of the hearing impaired, enabling them to make the most of the world of sound and the almost unlimited possibilities of the devices connected to the internet.

We also launched Neuro 2, an Oticon Medical product. The elegant Neuro 2 is all about discretion, but it's much more than just its size. Combining great sound quality and a wealth of innovative features and accessories for all ages, its design has already won a number of prestigious awards. With

the introduction of Neuro 2, we are having the opportunity to increase our market share in the Brazilian IC segment.

Do you participate in any government tenders for hearing equipment in Brazil?

As mentioned earlier, wholesale in Brazil operates through two different channels: the government channel and the independent channel. The government channel distributes two brands: Oticon and Sonic.

Through the Hearing Care Program, the Brazilian government offers hearing aids and assistance for the population in general. The Oticon government channel represents 20% of the total Brazilian market share.

Do you have any investment plans for Brazil in the coming years?



The necessary tax reform

Tax Reform is a recurring theme on the Brazilian political agenda. In fact, the national tax system ranks as one of the most complex in the world, having a prominent (negative) position in rankings that measure the time it takes taxpayers to meet their tax obligations during the year.

Although there are several reasons why the Brazilian tax system is extremely complex, the most sensitive point for companies seems to be indirect taxation, as Brazil has five such taxes in the three spheres of government: the PIS, Cofins and IPI taxes at the federal level, the ICMS tax at the state level and the ISS tax at the municipal level. These taxes are all independent of each other (that is, they do not generate credits against each other) and their legislation establishes quite different methods for different products, services and economic segments, such as tax substitution and single-phase sytems, withholding taxes, different tax rates and benefits for some industries. All this is accompanied by varied and often complex ancillary obligations, not to mention the typical situations in which taxpayers accumulate credits from some taxes and have great difficulty recovering the accumulated amounts.

Given this, some proposals for tax reform are on the agenda of the National Congress and the one that has made the most progress is Constitutional Amendment Proposal (PEC) 45/2019, authored by Congressman Baleia Rossi, which supports the proposal to create the tax on goods and services (IBS) suggested by the Center for Fiscal Citizenship (CCiF).

The proposal aims to extinguish the five indirect taxes currently collected by the government (IPI, PIS, Cofins, ICMS and ISS) and create a new tax (IBS), which would be levied on goods, merchandise, services and intangibles. Under the proposal, the collection of the IBS tax would be divided among the federal, state and municipal governments, with each entity having the ability to establish the percentage that would be due to it within the single rate of the tax, according to certain criteria provided for in the proposal. The payments to states and municipalities would be due to the states and municipalities to which the goods and services are sent.

The proposal has several advantages over the current system. Firstly, the simplification would be drastic, not only by replacing the calculation and collection of five taxes with the calculation and collection of only one, but mainly due to the probable reduction of the numerous ancillary obligations and formalities that must be fulfilled by taxpayers today.

In addition, the payment of indirect taxation to the place of destination of the good or service tends to reduce the "race to the bottom" that occurs between states and municipalities, although the meaning of "destination" should be clarified to avoid potential controversies, such as the current dispute regarding the state entitled to collect the ICMS tax levied on socalled indirect imports involving different states (using trading companies).

Another advantage of the proposal is to standardize taxation among the various sectors of the economy, ending the numerous sectoral regimes that make indirect taxation extremely complex and less isonomic. This standardization is due to the prohibition on the granting of any kind of tax benefits by taxing entities, which has been the target of some criticism, especially for the absence of alternative proposals for regional incentives.

PEC 45/2019 would also end the selectivity of ICMS and IPI taxes, which requires products considered essential to be taxed at lower rates than less essential ones. This measure has also been the target of criticism, as selectivity is intended to reduce the tax burden of products considered essential and, therefore, ending it would

mainly impact the poorer population. However, considering that the proposal also provides for the refund of the IBS on products and services purchased by low-income people, this criticism would be weakened, depending on the appropriateness and effectiveness of the refund proposal.

On the other hand, some questions still seem to remain unanswered, such as the benefits of the Manaus Free Zone, which last until 2073 under the current text of the Federal Constitution. In this context, it is doubtful whether the approval of PEC 45/2019 would mean partial revocation of the benefit, as IPI, PIS and Cofins taxes (in addition to the ICMS tax, in some cases, via state legislation) are encompassed by the favorable regime that would be extinguished within ten years. If so, the question remains whether the amendment could simply revoke it without any counterpart to the taxpayers established in the benefited area, which tends to take the issue to the judicial level, given the historical case law of the Supreme Court regarding the impossibility of revoking tax benefits granted for a fixed term and with consideration from taxpavers (as is the case with ZFM).

Another very controversial point is the silence of PEC 45 regarding tax credit balances (mainly for the ICMS tax), as there is no guarantee that taxpayers could use such balances to reduce the IBS to be collected. The situation of credits to be recovered via lawsuits is similar, since these would be offset against the taxes that would be extinguished.

In any case, the eventual approval of PEC 45/2019 would not be sufficient to make the Brazilian tax system perfect, as there are other points of Brazilian taxation that would require a deep review, such as heavy payroll taxation. In addition, the proposal provides for a transition period of 10 years, in which the IBS tax would coexist with the other indirect taxes, which would inevitably cause companies a little more complexity. Over this transition period there would also be the risk of possible extensions, as has already been the case in many so-called "provisional" tax measures, which would extend taxpayers' afflictions.


Alongside PEC 45/2019, there are other proposals for tax reform pending, two of which are notably intended to also simplify indirect taxation, while suggesting the adoption of a dual VAT, with one levied by

the federal government and the other by states and municipalities, with the possibility of their later adherence to the federal tax. However, if the ICMS and ISS taxes were to be maintained, the reform would certainly miss the opportunity to eliminate many of the problems of our current system, although it is politically much easier to approve any reform that keeps these taxes as they are today (or at least very close to that).

In short, any proposal to simplify the national tax system is positive, as it would tend to make the business environment much more investment-friendly and thus promote the country's growth. The issue, therefore, is to discuss the necessary adjustments to the proposals in question, as well as to think carefully about their regulation, so as to preserve the objectives, foundations and principles of the Federal Constitution and at the same time promote an effective simplification of the system.

The Brazilian General Data Protection Law



On August, 14, 2018, the Brazilian Congress enacted a full-fledged data protection bill, the so-called Brazilian General Data Protection Law ("LGPD" in Portuguese). The bill initially foresaw a 18-month adaptation period, however, an extension of such adaptation period was approved by the Brazilian Government, thus, the bill shall come into effect after 24 months, in August 2020, and companies will have until then to adapt their internal procedures to LGPD standards.

Inspired by the European General Data Protection Regulation "GDPR", the LGPD creates a new legal framework for the use of personal data in Brazil, both online and offline, in the private and public sectors. In addition to heightening the protection of individual rights, the LGPD aims to encourage sustainable development of the economy and the businesses, based on the best international practices. By having a General Data Protection Law, Brazil enters the list of approximately 120 countries that today may be considered to have an adequate level of protection of privacy and the use of personal data.

Non-compliance with LGPD terms can lead to penalties including administrative penalties, fines, blocking or eliminating the personal data object of the breach or even publish the breach, thus making

it known. Fines may vary from 2% of the company's, group's or conglomerate's revenue in Brazil in its last fiscal year, limited in total to BRL 50,000,000.00 (fifty million reais) per infraction. There is also the possibility of a daily fine to compel the entity to cease violations.

When applying penalties, it will be assessed whether the company adopts measures aimed at processing personal data safely and adequately, in a manner that minimizes damages and also the existence and application of good privacy practices and policies.

In this regard, companies will have to demonstrate compliance and responsibility with the laws in force, in order to increase the level of trust of all their stakeholders, suppliers, consumers, and commercial partners. The protection of personal data should be seen not as a cost, but as a market differential. Adaptation to a near future regulation is an investment and a competitive advantage.



Falck Fire & Safety do Brasil S/A

Falck Fire & Safety do Brasil S/A is a Brazilian subsidiary of Falck in the IFS (Industrial Fire Service) division. The entity operates within rescue and firefighting for industries like Nuclear power plants, Refineries, Petrochemical and Airports. The company is based in Rio de Janeiro and managed by CEO Erik Petersen and CFO Jens Gaardsvig. Although Brazil has experienced difficult economic conditions for some years, and Falck's business exposure is limited to BtB in Brazil, the company is lucrative and there is optimism for the future in Brazil.

Initially, the focus was on acquiring competitors in Brazil, thus procuring dynamic growth within industrial firefighting and ambulance service but attempts have not been successful and it was deemed that future attempts would also not pass due diligence as labor contingencies are common

in Brazilian manpower-related business. It was decided early on to change strategy and aim for organic growth in a top-down approach with a slower, but healthier start where Falck endeavor to gain contracts in complex industries, which are typically characterized by significant consequences in cases of business interruption or with significant assets to protect.

It is mainly the privatization of the Brazilian airports administered by public operator Infraero to private operators that Falck has decided to focus on in Brazil, where 9 international airports have been privatized so far and further 13 airports are in transition after an auction in March 2019. Further on, an additional 22 airports are expected to be auctioned for concession later in the year or early next year. Eventually, it is expected that all 56 airports operated by

Infraero will be auctioned in long-term concessions for Operation, Maintenance and Expansion in a build-own-transfer setup.

Falck operates ARFF (Aircraft Rescue and Fire Fighting) in the international airports of Rio de Janeiro and Belo Horizonte with approximately 250 firefighters working mainly from the restricted area along the runways with support to parking area and structural buildings like terminals and cargo area. The service is based on ICAO annex 14 (ICAO, a part of United Nations covering regulations for international airports) and implemented in resolution 279 and RBAC153 in Brazil by ANAC and covers rescue of passengers in major accidents following international agreements which ensures the same passenger safety standards in airports of departure and destination across countries. The services were until recently only provided by specially trained public firefighters, but after the privatization of airports the tendency is that the service is transferred to suppliers in the private sector and Falck is a leader within this transition which is expected to continue over a couple of years until the agreements with public firefighters are terminated and those can be routed to urban activities outside the airports.

Falck provides brigades and consultancy to large airports (typical class 4 airports with more than 5 million passengers) and emergency response category 8-10, where CAT10 refers to airports receiving large-sized aircrafts like A380 or B747-800. Rio de Janeiro International airport was the first to reach CAT10 in Brazil shortly after Falck assumed ARFF response. The trend is that the larger the aircraft transiting in the





airport, the larger the equipment in emergency response and the more complex the rescue and firefighting services are. Falck provides the full package including brigades, training, and consultancy.

Besides firefighting, Falck has also been accredited by ANAC to train Airport firefighters throughout Brazil as the only private company in the country. During 2018 and 2019 Falck has deployed their mobile training units (40" container with equipment, including an 8x22M2 LPG fueled fire simulator which is assembled on location to train the rescue of passengers through a fuel spill fire which is a likely scenario after an aircraft crash). The training unit has been as far south as Porto Alegre (Rio Grande do Sul) and as far north as Boa Vista (Roraima) traveling almost 2,000km along the Amazon river after a training session in Macapá (Amapá) and is currently in route from Manaus to Porto Velho in Rondônia, which is a 7-day transport operation by truck due to difficult logistic conditions. In all some 1,000 civil or public firefighters in most of Brazil's international airports have received training and become specialized airport firefighters. In Class 4 airports, airport firefighters are required to annually renew their certificate to stay complaint.

Falck in Brazil was among the first in IFS to implement the ISO series 9001/14001 and 18001. Procedures were developed not only on company level, but also with SOPs (Standard Operational Procedures) for each site location operated by Falck, including training, with clear goals defined in service level agreements and a system to collect the data to ensure the service is on track. Implementing a service with quality level based on international commitments in a systemized way was a challenge as ARFF knowledge previously has been heavily based on the local fire chief in vertical militaristic organizations and clients had felt significant inconsistency of quality in the past depending on the management on work that day. To ensure maintaining a level of quality expected by the Falck Group, it became imperative to create an OE-SESCINC (Educational organization for ARFF) with a more horizontal approach to developing skills across each level in the firefighting organizations, which later were able to provide its services to other airports as well. At the Falck sites each firefighter participates in 40 hours of recurrent training per month to ensure competence in the use of equipment and knowledge of potential scenarios in major crises and related procedures.

Until September 2018 Falck further owned the largest offshore maritime security training facility in Latin America named Falck Safety Services, which is located in Macae. A strategic change in the Falck group resulted in the unit being divested together with other Falck safety service units in some 18 countries around the world to a Danish-Swedish equity company named Polaris based in Copenhagen. The Macae unit continues its training operation now under the name: RelyOn Nutec and is no longer a part of the Falck group.

Union and State decide to reassess the planned bridge which will link the shores of Porto de Santos According to Junior Bozzella, doubts about the dry connection projects must be clarified

The proposal from Ecovias anticipates that the bridge will be around 7.5 km long (Divulgação/Ecovias)

The bridge project that promises to connect the shores of the channel of the Santos Port will be re-evaluated by the State and Federal Governments, by Companhia Docas do Estado de Sao Paulo (Codesp) and by road concessionaire Ecovias, responsible for the study and the execution of the work, whose cost has been estimated at BRL 2.9 billion.

The decision was made on Tuesday June 4th in the afternoon, in Brasilia, after the President of Codesp, Casemiro Tércio Carvalho, revealed some concerns about the negative impacts that the structure may result in during a future expansion of the port complex. He encourages the construction of a tunnel.

For almost a year, the project had permission from the State to be developed. At the moment, it is waiting for the completion of the environmental licensing so the services can be started. Due to the investment, Ecovias will have the contract for administration and exploitation of the expanded Anchieta-Imigrantes System (SAI).

Present in the meeting, Congressman Junior Bozzella (PSL-SP) agreed that reassessing the proposal was the best choice. According to him, the representatives of Ecovias did not clarify the doubts about the impacts of the construction raised by the Chairman of the Port authority of Santos and also by the National Secretary of Ports and Waterway Transportation, Diogo Piloni.

The Congressman said that it was not clear if the construction will speed the flow of trucks in the port complex.

The same questions, he said, apply to an eventual tunnel. Bozzella wonders how the connection can help the population and heavy vehicles.

The Congressman said that during the next few days, everyone will exam the project, in order to raise more data and reduce risks of choices. "A new meeting, with the presence of technicians of the Transport Agency of the State of Sao Paulo [Artesp], will be scheduled thereafter. Secretary Piloni added that the meeting may be in Santos, at Codesp, or in Sao Paulo, at Ecovias or at State of Logistics and Transport Secretary [which has also participated in the meeting], "he said.

Bozzella points out that the matter should be brought to the awareness of the population in more depth. He promised that public hearings will be held with that goal in mind. "There will be this dry connection. However, I think the intervention is valid at this point. There were points without understanding".

In an announcement, Ecovias reported that in a large project such as the connection of the river banks of the Port, "it is natural to have numerous meetings". The company says that last night's encounter served to clarify points and ratify the debates already made. "Following the natural course of the process, new meetings must happen".

Morten Soubak

to win his 2nd World Championship

On August 1st, Luanda, Angola with Morten Soubak as head coach took the historical first Super Globe title by winning over a Chinese Club team in the final by 27-22.

The tournament was held in Wuxi in China from the 1st-4th of August 2019 with 8 teams from all around the world participating. After beating the host team from Jiangsu in the quarter final we had to face Concordia from Brazil in the semifinal. It was a very tough and tight match, however the African team won 20-17.

"It's an important title to bring back to our club, with the big investments they are doing, to Angola/ Africa getting African women's handball on the international map and extremely important to women's handball worldwide to have this competition like the men already play since 1997" says Morten Soubak.

He continues to tell about a fantastic year with the team:"... we haven't lost a game for more than a year, winning the last 8 international competitions including the National League in July, African Club Championship in April in Morocco and the Champions League for African club teams in October last year in Ivory Coast".

But not only has it been a great year with the Angola club, Primeiro de Agosto. Morten Soubak is also the head coach for the Angola National women's handball team. They just won the Pan African Games in Casablanca, Morocco, by beating Cameroon in a very difficult final by 28-25.

Last year the Angola National women's handball team qualified for the World

Championship in Japan by winning the African Championship in Brazzerville, Congo. "We had to struggle a lot against Senegal in the final. Being behind by 8 goals we had to change a little bit and we fought back and succeeded to turn the game and win the title. Now we are looking forward to playing the Olympic qualification in Senegal. It's gonna be 3 very difficult games against DR Congo, Cameroon and Senegal. Only the winner will qualify for Tokyo 2020. In December we will play the World Championship in Kumamoto, Japan. We are in a very complicated group with Norway, Holland, Serbia, Slovenia and Cuba. Only 3 teams will qualify for the main round. So it's gonna be very difficult but we are ready to give it a big shot" says Morten Soubak.





Nicholai Wiig-Hansen a great Danish designer!



Nicholai Wiig-Hansen is a self-made industrial designer. He has owned his own design studio since he was 25 years old.

He grew up in an artistic home being the son of one of the most respected contemporary Danish artists, Svend Wiig Hansen. His mother, Leila Wiig Hansen, was a trained ceramist and artist.

From a very young age he noticed that he started observing objects and taking an interest in industrial production and how the items were produced. He was fascinated by the fact that you could make a business out of designing and producing items. Also, he found out that he was good at it.

Nicholai worked closely with Ikea for several years. He's the designer behind many Ikea classics, such as the red metal cabinet, PS Locker, and the home office chair, Jules.

"It's funny that people might not know you, but when you show them the Ikea metal cabinet, PS Locker,

most people know it or have it in their home. In a way, I've been a part of everyday life in millions of homes". Among the more recent products designed by Nicholai are the thermo jug, Geo Jug, manufactured for the brand Normann Copenhagen, and My Chair, also manufactured for Normann Copenhagen.

Nicholai has worked in different fields, such as working with the outdoor company Primus, lighting companies, carpet manufacturers, and has developed a design concept for one of Denmark's largest supermarket chains, Netto. He has furthermore worked with food and chocolate companies.

Nicholai is also an external professor at the prestigious Swiss design school Ecal and creative director of raawii.

As a designer, I'm a perfectionist. Before you release your product, you should fight for the highest level of quality. When I'm working with colors, I'm not just working with one blue color. I take 30 different colors

of blue and observe them in different environments and light settings before deciding on the final blue color. This way I'm 100 % sure that I'm satisfied with the outcome. "I can't say what is my biggest success. I've had many successes and continue having them. I'm very blessed working with my passion and having worked with so many different companies and people all around the world. I'm lucky being a designer where there's continuous development, you never stop learning and evolving. And the older I get, the more I expect from myself because I keep getting wiser and want to do better based on my past experiences. Money doesn't drive me. I'm in a constant competition with myself to do better than previously. It's sometimes a challenge because it demands awareness of yourself and you need to be 100 % honest to yourself. I'm a strong believer in self reflection, good and bad, otherwise you're not able to bring it to the edge of your personality. It's an area where messy things can happen, if you dare. An area that's not safe and where you can possibly fail hugely. There are different ways to get there and I believe you need to be surrounded by people pushing you. I'm also lucky to be in a business where there's no retirement age".

Danish design abroad

"At the moment there's a certain hype where design companies started in the past 15 years are redefining Danish design. They've had a massive breakthrough abroad and their success has created curiosity and paved the way for many Danish designers.

Investors are now taking an interest in these companies spotting a good investment with little risk taking.

However, I believe that the Danish design education is insufficient. I'm a guest professor at the Lausanne-based school Ecal where we know and teach the students the importance of collaboration with the industry and companies, and that it's a business they're getting into. It's a craft where we need to make products that increase profits and turnovers.

In my opinion, it's wrong to make design education too academic. You don't debate or argue yourself into a success, you go out and make a good product and prove yourself.

We also live in a time where it's extremely easy to communicate your message on social media. If you have the right product and communicate your product, the right people will notice you. It's never been easier to get your message out there than it

is today. The struggle is making the right product AND communicating your message the proper way.

I think we should do less but better products; that's our responsibility as designers and that's part of the reason why I started my own design brand with my business partner. I wanted to prove to myself that my way of thinking and my vision could be a success, and not just be all talk.

In raawii we made a very simple strategy about how we wanted to work together and who we wanted to work with. Then we tried to communicate that. Part of our strategy is to be open minded and not fixated on a certain strategy. Our structure is always open to our gut feeling and then we execute the idea as fast as possible.

About raawii and Strøm collection

Two years ago, Nicholai started his own design brand, raawii, with his good friend and business partner Bo. It all started with a Danish art museum, Brandts Klædefabrik, contacting Nicholai to contribute to their exhibition with the Danish artist Wilhelm Lundstrøm. Nicholai decided to do a brand new collection of ceramic pieces inspired by a cubist period in art where Lundstrøm was one of the artists practicing this art form. This ceramic collection, Strøm, was the starting point for the design brand raawii. The Strøm collection very quickly became a success and now some of the greatest museums in the world sell the collection; MoMa, Tate, Louis Vuitton Foundation, Louvre Abu Dabi amongst many others.

Nicholai just launched a ceramic collection, Jam, with a Danish artist, Michael Kvium." It was very important to us not making a limited edition collection. It's industrially produced items made from an artist's perspective. The reason for not wanting to make a limited edition is that we want as many people as possible to own beautiful quality items in their homes.

Most limited editions are 500-3,000 items and I don't consider that being limited. We visited the factory in Portugal together in order for Michael to get an understanding of how this type of production works. Michael was involved in the entire production from A to Z enabling him to do the best possible products. The collection has been very well received."

"We also made a new glass collection, Ralæ, with vases and bowls. I've always been fascinated by the refraction of light

in glass. Because light constantly changes, something amazing happens in that split second when the light hits the glass. It's a brief moment that passes by very quickly and will probably not happen again in the same way. I chose to have the glass items hand blown in order to make each product unique with its own imperfections.

"In raawii we had a clear strategy: we wanted to sell in design museums and the best design stores and we've succeeded in doing that.

In the future, raawii wants to be a design brand/agency where we collaborate with other brands, for example within the food and tech industry. Hopefully we'll attract sharp minds."



Pilates Studio

Due to intense work routines and chores these days, the need and pursuit of a healthier lifestyle has increased over the years, not only through healthier eating, but also through physical exercise.

It was in order to provide well-being and quality of life for others that the economist and dancer Suzana Andersen deepened into the Pilates method, opening her first classes in 2000 at the Clube Athletico Paulistano. To spread the practice and benefits of physical activity to a wider audience, Suzana opened the doors of Studio Suzana Andersen's second unit in 2016, located at Rua Augusta, in the Cerqueira César neighborhood of Sao Paulo.

The Studio offers a wide range of disciplines, offering students from the most traditional practices such as Mat Pilates, Studio Pilates, Hatha Yoga and Classical Ballet to the most current and innovative practices such as Aero Pilates, Pilates Ballet, Fly Yoga, AcroYoga and Contemporary Dance.

AcroYoga is a group work, where practitioners perform the traditional Yoga postures in pairs and more acrobatically. Although the postures are usually made up of two people, it is indicated that the practice is done by a trio composed of: BASE - the person below, giving the base for the flyer to perform the postures; FLYER - the person

standing on top, performing the postures; and ANGEL - the person next door, avoiding possible falls and injuries. This modality is becoming increasingly practiced not only for the numerous benefits of yoga such as body-mind balance, breath control and a host of stress-reducing factors, but also for working on personal issues, like traumas and fears, self-confidence and trust in each other, responsibility and seriousness towards others, and of course, for being so much fun. In addition, it is a practice that helps in disinhibiting, strengthening relationships, gaining muscle mass and body awareness, and stimulating focus and concentration.

Air sports such as Aero Pilates and Fly Yoga are very challenging because most exercises are done on an unsteady basis, where students are suspended by a circuslike fabric. They therefore require greater concentration, resulting in a blurring of problems and issues outside the classroom and greater focus on oneself. These are current practices and much sought after by people who like to leave the comfort zone and who seek a constant personal evolution. The Aero Pilates class has striking features of a fitness class, with a brief warm-up and stretching at the beginning, followed by Pilates exercises with a focus on balance and body center (abdomen or core), ending with suspended stances and stunts in the fabric.

Fly Yoga, however, has a calmer pace, following the principles of a traditional Yoga class. The class begins with a brief



meditation, mind-focused breathing, followed by a choreographed class with Yoga postures suspended in the fabric, ending with aromatherapy, which ensures a total sense of well-being.

Contrary to what most people think, the practice of air modalities is suitable for everyone (if the individual has a medical issue or injury, it is important to consult your doctor first and advise the teacher). Many exercises are performed in inverted postures (upside down), doing traction and decompression of the spine, relieving pain and discomfort; other exercises are worked with unilateral support, improving the balance and body awareness of practitioners; In addition, they are classes that strengthen and stretch the muscles simultaneously, avoiding possible injuries, building a stronger and healthier body.

Contemporary Dance follows the same structure as Classical Ballet with greater freedom of movement. Side flexions of the trunk, hands as well to perform a few steps and not just the feet, ground bearings, among other breaks in the stiffness of the



Classical Ballet. We can say that it is a more acrobatic dance that allows expressing and extraving feelings, a way of working body and soul at the same time.

The work developed at Studio is based on the technique of famous modern dancers such as Martha Graham, Jose Limón and Merce Cunningham, an inheritance passed by Suzana's master Ruth Rachou, pioneer of modern dance and Pilates method in Brazil.



Disease Leadership in Denmark and Brazil

Cardiovascular disease is an increasing problem in Brazil and Denmark alike, causing premature deaths, health problems and loss of life quality for a large group of people. At the same time, these diseases constitute an important cost for the public health systems in both countries.

Hence, during the past year, Innovation Centre Denmark in São Paulo, which is located at the Danish Consulate General, has had as one of its focus areas to increase cooperation between Denmark and Brazil within this area. The cooperation covers both research and education.

As reported in the May-August edition of Brazilian Review, a delegation of doctors, researchers and innovators from leading hospitals and universities in São Paulo and Rio de Janeiro visited Denmark in October. There they met with doctors, researchers and startups in Copenhagen, Odense, and Aarhus. The contacts made during the visit led to several results and promising project ideas. Among the results is the participation in May by nine Brazilian doctors in Danida courses in Denmark. The courses are financed and tailored by the Danida Fellowship Centre's scholarship programme.

Dr Fernando Ganem, Dr Luiz Cardoso (both from Hospital Sírio Libanés) and Dr Thiago Pinto (Hospital Beneficência Portuguesa) were among four doctors who visited Denmark, participating in the 7-day "Cardio Metabolic Disease Leadership Course". The course was organized jointly by Danida and the University of Copenhagen and was directed at health professionals at higher local, regional and federal level.

The course was a mixture of lectures by Danish experts, visits to relevant institutions within the field of cardiovascular diseases, and course work by the participants. During the course, the participants were introduced to some of the main players in the Danish health care system related to the area. These included the State University Hospital in Copenhagen (Rigshospitalet), the Department of Public Health at the University of Copenhagen, a municipal health care centre, the Steno Diabetes Centre at Novo Nordisk, the National Health Agency, the Ministry of Health, and the Danish Heart Foundation.

Participants were also introduced to nonpharmacological measures of primary and secondary prevention, as well as for example the relation between air-pollution and cardiovascular diseases, which is a focus area of the Department of Public Health at the University of Copenhagen.

Dr Fernando Ganem was impressed by the research within the area of air-pollution: "The University of Copenhagen's research is of extreme importance and certainly would be useful in our city," he said after the course, adding that "this is also a focus area for research in Brazil, and we have some strong experts in the area, too."

Thiago Pinto found it very inspiring to hear about the non-pharmacological initiatives in Denmark: "We got some takeaways relevant for the Brazilian health system, mainly, the investment to change the city and stimulate the practice of physical activity." Fernando Ganem and Thiago Pinto also both found it interesting that the Danish public health care system cooperates with NGOs. Thiago Pinto said that "this is something that is not done in Brazil. I believe it could be very beneficial to the Brazilian health care system, if guidelines are created together with health NGOs to make sure that the popular opinion is represented in the health system." In the same line of thought, Fernando Ganem added that "it would probably be possible to improve health quality if society, NGOs and universities started working closer together."

Finally, Luiz Cardoso said: "We were impressed by the organization of the Danish primary care services for cardio-metabolic diseases. I believe we have a lot to share. as Hospital Sírio Libernes has several proiects in this area and also in the area of innovation within telemedicine. We had the opportunity to know several scientific projects carried out at the University of Copenhagen and I am sure that we also have a great opportunity for cooperation here." To facilitate that the course content could be related to the participants specific environments, they were asked to do coursework on topics they had selected beforehand as being of special importance for their daily work. Here, Fernando Ganem focused on the detection of hypertension and follow-up blood pressure measurements. Thiago Pinto chose electronic medical records, while Luiz Cardoso focused on the comparison between patients taking multiple dose insulin versus insulin pump therapy - improving clinical outcomes. By the end of the course, the participants presented the results of the coursework for their fellow participants, thus showing the different take-aways that the participants had from the course.


At the Innovation Centre Denmark, we are very happy that it was possible to provide this course for Brazilian high-level health professionals. Knowledge exchange and education as seed for future collaboration is vital. We think that such activities show that a lot can be learned both ways between Brazil and Denmark, both within the health area in general and within cardiovascular disease in particular. Health problems are a global issue. Sharing knowledge and learning from others on a global level is the key to create better health solutions. In September, five more Brazilian health professionals will go to Denmark to take part in the three-week long Danida course on "Cardio-Metabolic Diseases". The knowledge exchange, mutual inspiration and network building activities will continue - and grow our Brazilian-Danish Cardiology Collaboration Platform further.

Innovation Centre Denmark (ICDK)

ICDK is a joint initiative by the Danish Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Ministry of Higher Education and Science. The purpose of ICDK is to improve collaboration, knowledge transfer and research between Denmark and selected innovation hubs around the globe. There are Innovation Centres in San Francisco, Boston, Munich, Mumbai,

Tel Aviv, Seoul, Shanghai and São Paulo. ICDK in São Paulo is headed by Consul General Nikolaj Fredsted and Consul for Research and Innovation Tina Gottlieb.





selling cargoes on CNF or buy FOB, basis. Both tasks can be rather difficult without the right tools and information, hence such support is well received and appreciated by customers. Vestas reaches 2GW in Brazil and consolidates its leadership in the country

The first half of 2019 was very special for Vestas in Brazil. In recent months, the Danish company with headquarters in Sao Paulo and a facility in Aquiraz, in the state of Ceará, has shown its long-term commitment to the country with the announcement of the expansion of its factory to produce the largest and most modern turbine in the Brazilian market, the V150-4.2MW. The turbines fit seamlessly into Brazil's wind conditions, including very competitive cost of energy and Vestas' ability to customize wind power solutions to the specific needs of each project.

Just nine months after the announcement of the factory's expansion, Vestas reached out the incredible milestone of 2GW accumulated in new orders for the V150-4.2MW from some of the biggest companies on the energy market as such as Casa dos Ventos, Echoenergia, ENGIE and EDF Renewables. The important 2GW milestone is aligned with the current moment of the wind market in Brazil: wind energy reached the 15 GW mark in installed capacity, becoming the second position in importance in the Brazilian power matrix, according to the Brazilian Wind Energy Association (ABEEólica). The country went from 1GW of installed capacity in 2010 to 15.1 GW this year, distributed in 600 wind parks in 12 states.

In addition to the democratization of renewable energy in the Brazilian market, Vestas also contributes directly to the generation of jobs in the country: it is estimated that with the expansion of the Aquiraz plant about 150 direct and 1,000 indirect jobs are generated in the region where the factory is located.

"Brazil is a key market for Vestas. Our last investments in the country showcase our trust in the potential of the Brazilian wind energy market. In a few months, we have reached the historic 2GW milestone locally, consolidating our leadership in Brazil. In this regard, we are also very glad to contribute so much to reduce the cost of wind energy and take wind energy from niche to mainstream", comments Rogério S. Zampronha, president of Vestas in Latin America South region.

Vestas' increasing footprint in Brazil is a good example of the paramount role that the company plays in the expansion of wind energy across the world. Startups in Brazil are maturing and becoming more relevant to larger companies

A Startup is a word that we hear more often nowadays, and for good reasons as it is becoming more important to both the domestic economy and companies of all sizes. A common definition of a startup is that it is a very small company with a global potential. Within this definition is the need for strong and fast growth, which is also an important part of the management focus of the startup.

Startups are closely connected with innovation, and today startups are as seen as one of the most efficient ways of introducing innovation in both society and for companies of all sizes. Innovation is essential because it is the primary way to increase productivity in a country, and Brazil is in need of increased productivity. According to the Conference Board Total Economy Database, productivity in Brazil has only increased by an average of 1.3% per year over the past 30 years. That is very low when we compare to emerging countries like India, China and Chile which have grown from 3% to almost 9% in average over the same period. This is also reflected in the fact that the Brazilian economy is only investing 1.3% of its

GDP in research and development, which is an important source of innovation, compared to other important countries which are investing at a level of 2% of their GDP or above.


During this decade, many economies all over the world are being characterized by significant changes in the rank of their largest companies. Today, the five largest companies in USA all represent the new digital economy, with Apple, Amazon, Google, Microsoft, and Facebook in the top five positions. In China, the two most valuable companies are the digital giants Alibaba Group and Tencent, which were not even on the list at the beginning of this decade. Brazil is one of the largest economies in the world, but differently from other large econo-

mies, there has been very little change in the rank of the largest companies in Brazil, where the top-five rank consists of Petrobras, Banco Itaú, Vale, Banco Bradesco, and Banco do Brasil; these five companies were also the most valuable Brazilian companies in the beginning of the decade. They all represent a traditional business model, and this lack of entry of companies with new business models is one of the consequences of the lack of innovation in the Brazilian economy.

On the other hand, key indicators show that the Brazilian economy is ready to engage with the new digital business models. Research from McKinsey show that Brazilians in average spend 5.0 hours on the Internet per day on any device compared to North Americans who spend 4.3 hours. It also shows that Brazilian mobile users spend twice as much time on their devices compared to those in the United States. The penetration of electronic commerce in Brazil is however still very low with about 6%, where China tops the list with 20% of the national commerce economy taking place on the Internet.

Over this decade, Brazil has been seen as a slow-moving country when it comes to this startup economy, but that has changed over the past couple of years with the appearance of the so-called unicorns. The term unicorn is being used to describe a startup reaching an evaluation of over USD 1 billion. In Brazil, eight startups by now have reached this benchmark with startups such as PagSeguro, 99, ifood, NU Bank as some of the front run-

ners. This is interesting when compared to other economies such as the Israeli one, for instance, which is known to produce a relatively high number of innovative companies, whereas one of the most well-known is Waze, which was acquired by Google for USD 1 billion. Until today, eight unicorns have so far emerged in both countries. This has placed Brazil on the global radar for venture capital. One segment where the number of startups has been growing significantly in Brazil is within financial technology, the so-called fintechs, including new banks. Most of these companies are niche players with focus on a specific segment or service. These companies are developing a wide range of services within financial assets and capital markets, payments, lending and financing, account management for both retail, commercial, and large corporate customers. This is not limited to banking-related activity but also includes insurance, which due to its nature is heavily based on data. Herein, it can offer new increased efficiency and innovation in the digital world with artificial intelligence and advanced data analytics, and these startups can offer services that are totally individualized to each and every customer. According to Fintech Radar, a Brazilian analyst company, there were more than 400 fintech startups in Brazil at the end of 2018. Some of these startups have established themselves as banks offering services to corporate or private

consumers. Among them are Banco Original, Banco Neon, Banco Inter and NU-bank. The latter has, according to the newspaper Estado de São Paulo, reached more than 10 million customers by the middle of 2019.


One way that large companies can innovate and reinvent themselves is through collaboration with startups, and several Brazilian companies are today already engaged in projects of this nature. TOTVS with the Idexo project and Gerdau has put large efforts in collaboration with startups, and among Danish companies in Brazil Maersk is also seeking collaboration with startups in the logistics area.

Both private and public Brazilian investors are also showing strong interest in the startup segment, and the Brazilian social economic development bank, BNDES, has launched more than 10 programs aimed at financing and accelerating startups in different segments. Eduardo Kaplan, manager for the Smart Cities program at BNDES presented the different programs at the European conference IOT Week, which this year was held in June in Aarhus, Denmark.

The 6th place was enough for Anne-Marie, her competitors couldn't catch up to her in the final ranking. It's the second time Anne-Marie Rindom wins the World Championship in Laser Radial.

We congratulate Anne-Maire on the World Championship. If she is selected, the next big task for Anne-Marie will be the Olympic Games - Tokyo 2020.




